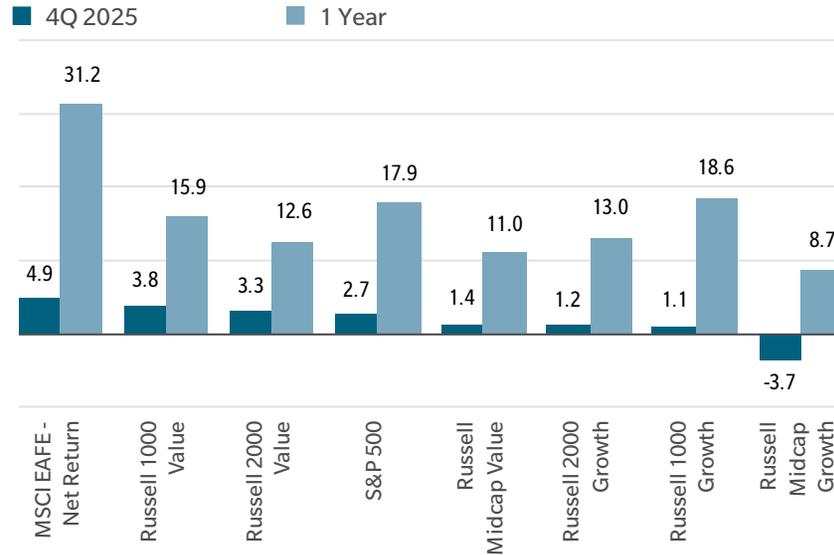

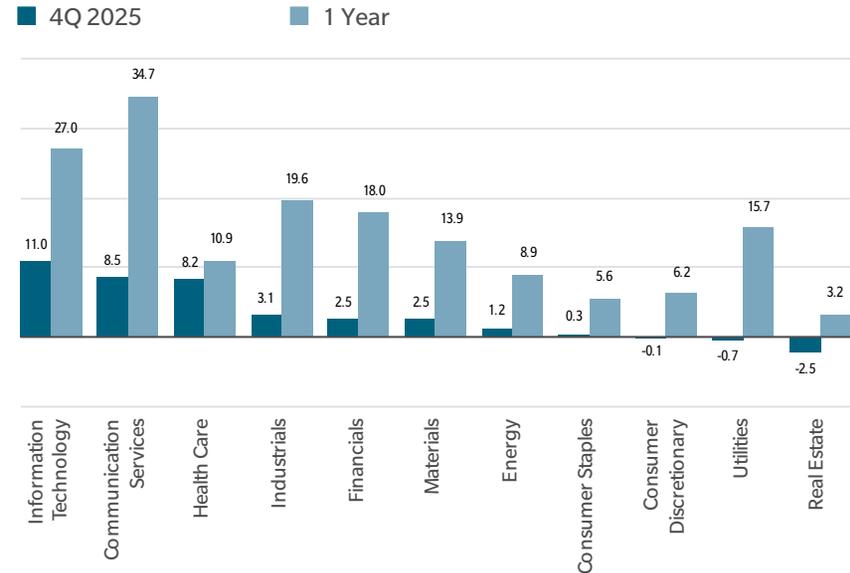
# Market Overview

## US equities market review as of 31 December 2025

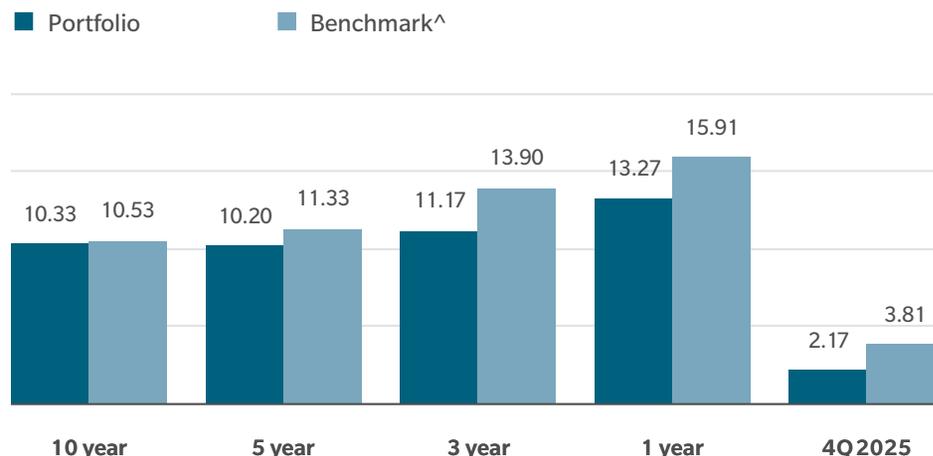
- The US market, as measured by the S&P 500 Index, finished higher in Q4 2025. Despite some small pullbacks during the period — driven by the Federal government shutdown, as well as questions on the pace of rate cuts and future AI spending — the market continued its upward move throughout the quarter. This built upon strong returns in Q2 and Q3, helping 2025 end as the third year in a row of double-digit returns.
- Economic growth in the US accelerated during Q3 2025, with GDP increasing 4.3% (initial estimate). This reflects increases in consumer spending, exports and government spending. However, due to some

- recent weakness in the labor market, the US Federal Reserve lowered interest rates twice during the quarter, marking three total cuts in 2025, although they signaled a potentially slower pace for additional cuts moving forward.
- For Q4, value outperformed growth in the large-cap, mid-cap and small-cap spaces. However, for the full year, growth outperformed in the large-cap and small-cap spaces. Over the quarter, health care, technology and financials were the best-performing sectors, and real estate, utilities and communication services were the worst.

<b>Alphabet Inc</b>	Not owning shares of technology company Alphabet (United States) detracted from relative performance. The stock price rose during the quarter as the company delivered stronger-than-expected financial results driven by robust advertising demand and continued leadership in search technology. The company successfully integrated AI tools that enhanced ad efficiency and monetization, while maintaining a competitive advantage over emerging rivals. Management's increased capital expenditure commitment reflected confidence in the scalability of its AI infrastructure and data center expansion opportunities.	-0.8
<b>Micron Technology Inc</b>	Not owning shares of semiconductor company Micron Technology (United States) hindered relative performance. The stock price increased as the company delivered exceptional results with record revenue and all-time high gross margins, demonstrating solid operational execution. The company delivered solid third-quarter performance with worldwide RevPAR increasing modestly, led by stronger growth in international markets. Marriott added net rooms during the quarter and achieved year-over-year growth, while the worldwide development pipeline reached a record level. Strong cash flow generation supported substantial shareholder returns through dividends and share repurchases, underscoring the benefits of its asset-light business model.	0.2

# Portfolio Outlook and Positioning



## Market Environment

The S&P 500 finished up nearly 18%, marking the third consecutive year of 15%+ gains, something last seen in the late 1990s. Performance remained unusually concentrated, with AI-linked mega caps contributing a disproportionate share of the index returns. Coming into 2025, with a focus on AI leadership, resilient earnings and capital inflows, investors widely expected US to be the best-performing region globally. Despite delivering another strong year in 2025, however, the US ended the year as the worst-performing major global equity market. High expectations for US equities left little room for upside surprise, while other markets benefited from a depreciating US dollar and experienced robust rallies from decades-low relative valuation starting points versus the S&P 500. Within the market, high beta, more speculative stocks substantially outperformed, while higher quality and value factors lagged, creating a challenging backdrop for disciplined, value-focused, quality-oriented portfolios like the MFS Large Cap Value strategy. Investors were paid for owning the most volatile, market-sensitive stocks, while more defensive and fundamentally resilient businesses underperformed. Notably, for the third-straight year, growth once again outperformed value, though the gap was smaller than in previous years.

Last year was a year that didn't proceed in straight line. The major themes driving markets throughout the year were the artificial intelligence investment boom, Fed policy shifts, evolving trade/tariff policies and geopolitical uncertainty. The year started with optimism that a more business-friendly administration would usher in less regulation and pro-growth policies. However, just four weeks into the year, the news that China's DeepSeek had trained its models for a fraction of the time and cost of US-based models created a crisis of confidence in the sustainability of AI capital expenditures, sending equity markets into a tailspin. Significantly greater-than-expected tariffs announced on Liberation Day (April 2) added fuel to the fire until the tariffs were paused on April 9. A significant high-beta, growth-led rally ensued and set the tone for the next several months. Heading into September, Fed policy shifted to an easing stance, cutting interest rates, and the market once again rallied strongly, led by the highest beta companies. While there were some leadership shifts throughout the fourth quarter, equity markets finished the year on a strong note.

## Portfolio Performance

The MFS Large Cap Value strategy underperformed the Russell 1000® Value Index for the calendar year of 2025. While the strategy was ahead of the Russell 1000® Value through the end of August, the significant high-beta rally that recommenced in early September led to underperformance in the fourth quarter and for the year.

The other significant performance headwind came from the strategy's avoidance of *Alphabet*. Three mega-cap technology names were added into the Russell 1000® Value benchmark during its annual reconstitution at the end of June. *Alphabet*, *Amazon* and *Meta* came into the index at a combined 5.3% weight. None of these companies were added to the MFS LCV portfolio based on our assessment of their relative risk/reward and considering both their durability and valuation as compared to other investment opportunities. While not owning Meta and Amazon positively contributed to relative performance, our avoidance of Alphabet was the single largest detractor from performance during the year, accounting for almost all of the strategy's annual underperformance.

When Alphabet was included in the Russell 1000® Value benchmark at the end of June, remedies for the Department of Justice's search monopoly case had not yet been determined. It is important to note that one potential remedy being considered was a forced divestment of the Chrome browser, discontinuation of payments to Apple for default search engine placement, and mandatory sharing of algorithms with competitors. While this outcome was unlikely, it would have posed considerable challenges for the company, and in our assessment, the valuation did not adequately compensate for this risk. The remedies ultimately announced in August were significantly more favorable than anticipated. Another key consideration in our decision not to hold Alphabet was concern over probable market share erosion in search. Google currently maintains a 90% share of the search market, representing the most important segment for Alphabet. Increased competition from emerging AI-focused firms such as OpenAI — who are expected to target both advertising and search for monetization — may threaten Google's dominant position. Although we anticipate Google will remain a major search provider, starting with a 90% market share means there is virtually nowhere for share to go but down. Given the substantial economic benefits derived from search, any market share loss could have a material impact on the company, with the extent of that impact dependent on where Google's market share ultimately stabilizes.

Contributors to performance include — avoiding *UnitedHealth Group* and owning *KLA Corp*, *McKesson*, *Raytheon* and *Citigroup* were all significant contributors to relative performance.

The MFS LCV strategy has always focused on providing downside risk mitigation, which has enabled us to deliver for clients in more difficult market environments. In 2025, the market saw both challenging selloffs and high-beta rallies, with the MFS LCV strategy outperforming during downturns and underperforming when speculative stocks rallied. The consistent performance of the strategy

during recent market fluctuations suggests that its relative underperformance in the past several years is primarily attributable to broader market headwinds rather than issues inherent to the strategy itself.

### New Opportunities and Transactions

Although recent market attention has been concentrated on AI-linked companies, we have been proactively exploring overlooked areas of the market, successfully identifying multiple attractive investment opportunities that we incorporated into this strategy in 2025. We added nine new positions to the portfolio throughout the year across several sectors, including financials (*Ares Management, Wells Fargo, LPL Financial*), health care (*Humana, Medline*), consumer staples (*Coca-Cola Europacific Partners, Philip Morris International*), and industrials and materials (*CRH, Caterpillar*). We also added to a number of existing holdings throughout the year. Some of the larger additions were to *Accenture, KKR, NXP Semiconductor, Cigna, PNC Financial, Xcel Energy, Kimberly-Clark* and *Equifax* as we took advantage of share-price weakness driven by shorter-term real or perceived headwinds. We also eliminated nine positions across several sectors (*CDW, Comcast, Corteva, DuPont, Medtronic, Mondelez, PPG, Solstice, Target*) in favor of more attractive opportunities. In addition, we actively trimmed back several holdings into strength (*JP Morgan, McKesson, American Express, Morgan Stanley, KLA, Citigroup* and *Eaton*) while reducing position sizes in a few names to reflect a changing risk/reward (*Aon, Nestle, Kenvue, and Pfizer*).

### Outlook

Looking ahead, it seems very likely that equity market returns in 2026 will be lower than those experienced over the last decade. There has never been a period in the last 30 years where the forward 10-year compounded annual rate of return for US equities has been greater than 2% when the starting forward P/E has been at current levels (20x). In fact, nearly all periods that started at the current or higher valuation levels have had negative 10-year forward returns.

Since 2020, the influence of macroeconomic considerations and other factors on equity markets has been unusually pronounced. Over the long term, however, company fundamentals and valuations drive the performance of stocks and markets. It seems quite likely that the coming months and years could bring more volatility — and potentially downside risks — to markets. Volatility always creates opportunities for long-term oriented investors. Recency bias is a significant factor in investor psychology, especially when prevailing trends persist over long periods. This can make it more challenging to anticipate change; however, historical evidence demonstrates that

markets do not move in a single direction indefinitely. While market cycles have elongated, they haven't disappeared. There is a high probability that equity markets will decline at some point in next several years. In appreciating markets, the benefits of downside risk mitigation are less apparent, but through the cycle, it is incredibly important in generating long-term returns. We believe that the opportunity from here for fundamental, bottom-up, quality value investors like the MFS Large Cap Value team is extremely compelling.
